Rivers Divided: Indus Basin Waters in the Making of India

Hydrologically, Pakistan is divided into two main catchment regions – the Indus basin and the dry area of Balochistan. The total catchment area of Indus River system is 374,700 sq. miles of which about 56% i.e. 204,300 sq. miles lies in Pakistan. Excluding the tributaries, the Indus River basin constitutes 213,674 square miles.

In Pakistan, the Indus river basin covers around 520 000 km², or 65 percent of the territory, comprising the whole of the provinces of Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and most of the territory of Sindh province and the eastern part of Balochistan.
